February 2025 Assignment - Golden Hour/Blue Hour

To be shown at the March general meeting

As photographers, we should be constantly aware of the light that we're using to capture our images. Angle, color, and intensity all play a part in our compositions. Shooting during the "golden hour" and "blue hour" can often add drama to our images, either through the angle of light that's falling on our subject or the color of light that's illuminating it.

The **golden hour** is the "hour" after sunrise and the "hour" before sunset. The term "hour" is used figuratively; the effect has no clearly defined duration and varies according to season and latitude. The character of the lighting is determined by the sun's altitude and depends on a location's latitude and time of year. The optimum time of year in Southern California is from October to March, when the sun stays fairly low in the sky throughout the day and yields a somewhat longer golden hour.

Most photographers know that the sun's angle has a major impact on how light behaves. During the golden hour, the sun is lower in the sky than during peak daylight hours, meaning that the sun's light must travel through more atmosphere before reaching your subject. That atmospheric diffusion softens and diffuses the light while also creating attractive warm hues. Additionally, since the sun is so low on the horizon, the light is directional, creating soft, long shadows.

The golden hour is also sometimes called the "magic" hour. During these times, the brightness of the sky can match the brightness of streetlights, sign, car headlights, and lit windows. The subjects we can shoot during the golden hour are limitless. From flowers to landscapes to people, the only limitation is our use of light and shadow to enhance our subject. Whether we're shooting in color or black and white, it's the quality of golden hour light that enhances our images.

The period of time shortly before the golden hour at sunrise, or after it at sunset, is called the **blue hour**. This is when the sun is below the horizon, when residual indirect sunlight takes on a predominantly blue shade, and there are no sharp shadows. Shooting early in the short time after sunset, especially if there are limited clouds, can yield warm western skies combined with a cool eastern sky and subjects illuminated by both skylight and artificial (man-made) light.

Blue-hour shooting lends itself more to landscape and architecture photography. Timing is somewhat critical, because darkness can arrive fairly quickly, taking with it the blue tones in the sky.

Venture out early or late in the day to capture what many consider to be the best light - at the golden hour and the blue hour.



February 2025 Field Trip

Shoreline Village/Queen Mary/ Aquarium of the Pacific

Date: Saturday, February 8th

Assignment: Golden Hour/Blue Hour

CARPOOL:

Meet at 9:00 a.m. at the south end of the AAA parking lot located on the northeast corner of Beach Boulevard and Stark Drive in Huntington Beach. Drive time is approximately 25 minutes from Huntington Beach to downtown Long Beach. Carpooling is a good way to go and get to know other members.

PARKING OPTIONS:

Shoreline Village Parking Lot: Parking is \$2.00 for first 2 hours with validation stamp from any Shoreline Village restaurant or shop. \$10.00 up to 6 hours. **Maximum parking fee is \$16.**

<u>Aquarium Parking Structure</u>: Parking is \$8.00 with Aquarium ticket validation. With validation stamp from nearby businesses, it's 'free' for first 30 minutes, \$8.00 for 2.5 - 4 hours. **Maximum parking fee is \$16** (for 8-24 hours).

Note: Rates subject to change. Both locations give a discount with validation form stores or restaurants.

<u>LUNCH</u>: Meet at Chili's at 12:00 p.m., located at 30 W. Shoreline Drive along the Boardwalk between Shoreline Village and Aquarium of the Pacific. We can sit in the restaurant's covered patio area.

SHORELINE VILLAGE is located within walking distance from downtown Long Beach.

The Boardwalk is currently open, as well as Wheel Fun Rentals, Long Beach Parasailing, and Marina Sailing. Shoreline Village restaurants are open, with a variety to choose from.

Shoreline Village is a waterfront shopping, dining and entertainment center that overlooks Long Beach's beautiful Rainbow Harbor. Wander and Explore! The Village welcomes visitors with a relaxed atmosphere and full complement of things to see and do. Styled after a quaint Cape Cod fishing village, Shoreline Village is a family friendly destination by day that develops a sense of romance when night falls.

Shoreline Village features an antique carousel, bike rentals to explore the Long Beach coastline, personal watercraft rentals, harbor cruises, and unique specialty shops. Dine at one of Long Beach's premier seafood restaurants, Parker's Lighthouse, while enjoying the amazing views. It's conveniently located within walking distance of the world-class Aquarium of the Pacific, and just across the harbor from the Queen Mary.

Shoreline Village has many quaint shops, eateries, carousel/arcade, bike and boat rentals. Situated along the Long Beach Marina overlooking Rainbow Harbor, you can stroll along the water or take a 45-minute narrated harbor cruise. You can also rent bicycles (surreys, tandems, cruisers) and ride along the waterfront looking out across the harbor at the Queen Mary, the *old* Spruce Goose dome, and cruise ship.

<u>General admission</u> - **Harbor Cruise (45 min. narrated tour)**: \$20.00 adults, \$15.00 children (5-11 yrs), and \$15.00 seniors 62+.

AQUARIUM OF THE PACIFIC is a wonderful place to explore. Here is the website for more info. https://www.aquariumofpacific.org/

The Aquarium is open from 9 am-6 pm. It's located at the opposite end of the marina (short walk from Shoreline Village). You'll see a wide variety of ocean life and other attractions. You can also walk up to Lighthouse Point/Shoreline Park for great views of Rainbow Harbor, Shoreline Village, and the Queen Mary.

<u>General admission</u> - **Aquarium**: \$44.95 adults, \$29.95 children (3-11), \$41.95 seniors 62+. *Reservations are required.





QUEEN MARY is a great place to take in the sunset and admire the views. The ship is docked just across the way from Shoreline Village and Aquarium of the Pacific. Queen Mary is now open for tours, just a short drive around the bay. http://www.queenmary.com

You can tour the Queen Mary or stroll through a quaint British village next to the ship. Instead of driving there and paying for parking, catch the **AquaBus** from the Aquarium (dock 4) or Shoreline Village (dock 9). The fare is \$1.00 each way. It operates from 11:00 am-6:20 pm. <u>General admission</u>- **Queen Mary/Glory Days Tour (1 hr)**: \$47.70 adults/seniors. and \$37.10 children.

Kids at Wedding

Libya, November 2006. A few soldiers of Colonel Gaddafi held me for a week at the border with Niger. What I was doing there is another story, but I saw human traffickers carrying about 50 fortune seekers across the border on top of a truck. With a few simple taps on his Kalashnikov, a soldier made it clear that it was forbidden to take pictures. But he was stronger than me, I secretly took a few pictures anyway...

After being stuck in this horrible place for 6 days, I started to think about what I wanted to do with my life as a 27-year-old. But the human traffickers didn't let me go either. Where do these people come from and what will their fate be? While I was daydreaming and enjoying a beautiful starry sky in the heart of the Sahara, all the pieces of the puzzle fell into place. As a child I always wanted to be a photographer and through that absurd situation among the human traffickers, everything became clear. As soon as I got back home to Belgium, I was going to give my life a different turn by making my childhood dream come true...

I first wrote 'C'est l'Afrique, Monsieur!'; a 500-page travelogue about my African adventure. Then I hung up my football boots and signed up for an evening course in photography, because I had to start from scratch. After 5 years of evening school, I was going to make it – in my head anyway – as a photographer. I was prepared to accept any assignment, except wedding reports. Who wanted to do that? Boring, posed stuff. This isn't photography, is it?

Until I discovered a way to make it not boring! What if I approached a wedding report as a documentary; just like I didn't have the opportunity in Libya to give guidelines, to make them smile for the lens or to stand in beautiful light. What if I just let people be themselves and I had to take care of beautiful compositions myself. From this moment on I became Kristof, the NINJA-style documentary photographer!

Suggested PSOC Critique Guidelines

PSOC was founded as a platform for image sharing and supportive self-improvement. With the expanded utilization of outside professional photographers to critique the members' submitted images, that mission has evolved into a shared desire to become more proficient in the art and craft of photography.

It is the responsibility of those who critique to foster that desire and encourage and *teach* the members through that critique. The critique should be a careful review of the images accompanied by an *opinion* regarding the overall strength of the image, as well as an *opinion* regarding the artistic and technical aspects of the image presented. Although the spectrum of photographers showing images includes beginners as well as some who are very advanced, learning and growth should be encouraged at all levels. The following guidelines have been formulated to bring a consistency of format to the critiques. These are not checklists, just suggestions to help the critiquers help our members improve their photographic craft.

- 1. What is your overall first impression? What impact does the image have for you? What do you like about the photograph? *Be concise*. Remember you are teaching *all* the members as well as the contributing photographer.
- 2. What *constructive* comments can you make? How does the composition and framing work? How does your eye take in the elements of the image? What gets your attention, and why? Note use of techniques like "rule" of thirds, leading lines, framing, patterns, lighting choices, and other visual elements. What helpful comments can you make?
- 3. How do you see the technical and processing factors contributing to the image? This may include perspective, exposure, highlight detail, shadow detail, bright and dark areas, contrast; processing of color or black and white, luminescence, contrast, vignetting, dodging, burning, and cropping.
- 4. Make it clear that your comments are all **your opinion** on how **you** might do it differently, based on your experience, personal style, vision, and processing preferences. Other artists/photographers may often see the image differently.
- 5. How might you encourage the photographer? Remember, the photographer has a reason to show this work and obviously feels good about it. You are encouraged to ask the photographer to comment on what they were seeing and expressing in the image. We would also like you to encourage the members in attendance to participate through questions and comments.
- 6. Although the title slide for each member's submittal does not need to be critiqued, an outstanding title image can be *quickly* noted.
- 7. *Please be concise in your comments*. The meetings are scheduled for two hours, and there can often be well over 100 images submitted.
